Specialty Programs In Jacksonville

HUBBARD HOUSE

For the following services available through Hubbard House please call their administrative phone number (354-0076), FAX (354-1342).

A. RAP (Relationship Abuse Prevention)

The RAP program involves visitation to middle and high school students to talk about abuse, healthy dating relationships, and conflict resolution. Presentations are made in the classroom for three full days.

B. HARK (Helping At Risk Kids)

The HARK program is a ten-week counseling program for children and youth living in violent homes.

C. First Step Program

This batterers' intervention program accepts self-referrals as well as those who are court ordered.

D. AWAKE (Abused Women and Kids in Emergency) Program

The AWAKE program is a mobile crisis intervention program designed to identify and provide advocacy for victims of domestic violence, rape and sexual assault. An AWAKE advocate serves as a conduit between patient and physician, and is available to all area hospitals on a 24 hour basis.

CHILDREN'S CRISIS CENTER, INC.

The Child Protection Team and the Child Sexual Abuse Program are both components of the Children's Crisis Center. They offer various services for the prevention, evaluation, and treatment of child abuse in families and children.

CHILD VICTIM RAPID RESPONSE SCHOOL PROGRAM

This is a school based team approach serving child victims and their families operated by Jacksonville Area Legal Aid, Inc (356-8371, ext 320).

ZIP (ZEROING IN ON PREVENTION)

Duval County Public Schools deals with substance abuse and violence prevention; domestic violence was added in the '90's. Part of the "Safe and Drug-Free Schools Program", (which includes Victory Over Violence) reaches pre-K through 12th grade, and provides instructional objectives and intervention strategies. There are five components: prevention, intervention, support services, community involvement and evaluation. This program comes with a parent handbook. VICTIM SERVICES CENTER

The center is known as a leader in victims' rights, advocacy and services to victims of crime. Since its establishment as the United States' first free standing "One-Stop-Shop" Victim Center, it has become a model for the nation. 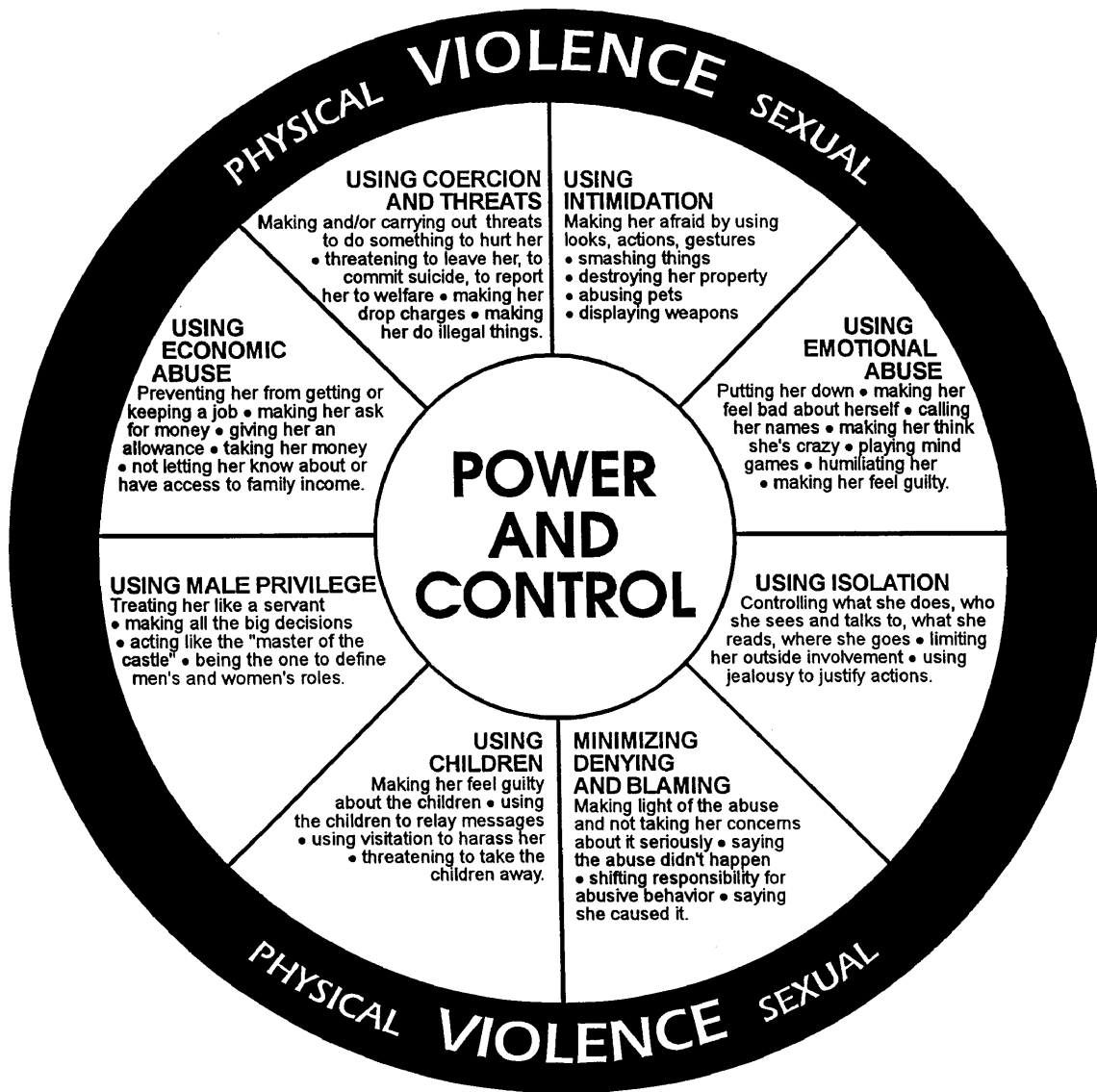
